Topic: *Purpose Protected Me!*

Scripture: Matthew 2:1–15 (Focus on vv.13–15)

1. Introduction: The Tension of Purpose

We live in a century obsessed with *purpose* but confused about what it truly means. Purpose is posted, branded, marketed, and performed, yet beneath the surface is a generation asking:

- *Who am I?*
- *Why am I here?*
- *What if I'm unseen, unqualified, or too late?*
- *Can my past disqualify my future?*

We talk about purpose constantly... but understand it rarely.

Our culture has turned:

- **Purpose into performance**
- **Identity into comparison**
- **Calling into competition**

But Scripture teaches a different story: **Purpose is not born from perfection; Purpose is born from redemption.**

And nowhere is that clearer than in how the New Testament begins.

2. Why Matthew? A Portrait of Redemption

Before we see Jesus in a manger, God chooses **Matthew** to hold the pen.

Matthew was:

- A tax collector
- Partner of Rome
- Traitor to Israel
- Barred from synagogue & temple
- Despised by religious leaders

Yet Jesus walks up to him and says: **“Follow Me.”**
Not *fix yourself*, not *prove yourself*, just *follow*.

And then Jesus entrusts Matthew to write the genealogy, the prophecies, the opening Gospel.

Matthew's calling reveals:

- God's choices offend human expectations.
- God calls those we would disqualify.
- Purpose begins where Jesus interrupts your past and says: "**I can use that.**"

If Jesus could choose Matthew—**He can choose you.**

3. Scene Shift: A Political Earthquake (Matthew 2:1–3)

The wise men arrive in Jerusalem asking:

"Where is the one BORN King of the Jews?"

This was not a peaceful Christmas moment, it was a direct threat to Herod's throne.

Herod is **troubled**—agitated, shaken, internally destabilized—because true purpose always exposes false positioning.

Herod was:

- Appointed by Rome, not God
- From no royal line
- Positioned, but **not purposed**

Jesus, however, was **born King.**

No palace. No crown. No performance.

Yet His identity was already established.

Key Principle:

The enemy fears who you are before he fears what you do.

Purpose is assigned *before* it is fulfilled.

4. The Wise Men Warned (Matthew 2:7–12)

Herod pretends he wants to worship.

He really wants to kill.

Not everyone who asks about your journey is invested in your well-being.

Some simply want access.

But God intervenes:

- The wise men are warned in a dream.
- They return home another way.

God is already protecting purpose.

5. The Instruction to Egypt (Matthew 2:13–15)

The angel tells Joseph: “**Take the child to Egypt...until Herod is dead.**”

To us, this seems simple.

But for Israel, Egypt meant:

- Slavery
- Bondage
- Trauma
- Genocide
- Generational wounds

Yet God sends Jesus **into the very place that once oppressed His people.**

Tension Question:

Why would God hide His Son in a place historically associated with pain?

Revelation:

“When you are purposed... I know how to hide you.”

Sometimes purpose looks like:

- Hiding
- Obscurity
- Being tucked away
- Being unseen
- Being protected

God will hide you **even in places that once hurt you.**

Egypt became:

- Israel’s trauma → Jesus’ shelter
- Israel’s oppression → Jesus’ protection
- Israel’s pain → Jesus’ preservation

Your past pain cannot cancel your present purpose.

6. Purpose Will Protect You

God hid Jesus until:

- the threat lifted,
- Herod died,
- and the timing was right.

And God does the same with you.

Prophetic Affirmation:

- You will not die in your Egypt.
- You will not repeat generational trauma.
- You are hidden, covered, and kept.
- Purpose is preserving you until the appointed time.

Because...

**It's been 12 months and you should have died...
but purpose protected you.**

**Depression should have swallowed you whole...
but purpose protected you.**

**The death in your family should have shattered you...
but purpose protected you.**

**The betrayal should've broken you,
the setback should've stopped you,
the storm should've silenced you...
but purpose protected you.**

You're still here
—still breathing,
—still standing,
—still becoming,

because **destiny would not let you go.**
